

Conrad A. Muessdorffer: Architectural Legacy

Conrad A. Muessdorffer (1871-1945), born and raised in San Francisco, established himself as an influential architect known for designing notable residential and commercial buildings throughout the city and Marin County. His career began in 1892 with Salfield & Kohlberg, followed by a partnership with Victor de Prose in 1895, before he opened his own practice in 1897. Muessdorffer's family, originally German importers, settled in San Francisco in 1853.

Most of Muessdorffer's work is concentrated in San Francisco, though he also contributed to Marin County's architectural landscape after relocating to Ross. Among his distinguished designs, 1925 Gough stands out as the only privately owned residence within Lafayette Park and created in the Beaux Arts style. He gained recognition as a master planner of grand neo-classical apartment buildings, with 2000 Washington and 2006 Washington often cited among the city's most attractive cooperative residences, renowned for their spacious layouts and panoramic views atop the crest of Pacific Heights.
